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


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18TH ANNUAL EANGI CHARITY GOLF CLASSIC



FORT POLK, La. – After 15 days in the sweltering Louisiana heat, the soldiers of the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 34th Infantry Division, and supporting units emerged from the Joint Readiness Training Center (JRTC) rotation 25-08 with sharpened skills, battle-tested endurance, and a renewed focus for their upcoming deployment.

The brigade's mission at JRTC was a complex, large-scale combat operation scenario simulating the defense of a partner nation against an invading force. Over nearly two weeks, the roughly 6,000 soldiers endured long hours, limited sleep, and unpredictable weather while executing their mission essential tasks list—attacking, moving to contact, defending, securing areas, and conducting air assaults.

Col. Eric Soults, the brigade commander, explained that while past training often mirrored counterinsurgency operations from the Global War on Terrorism, the LSCO framework focuses on nearpeer threats and combat-heavy scenarios.

"Standards and discipline matter," he said. "If you're

undisciplined in a LSCO environment, you're going to be undisciplined in an Operation Inherent Resolve environment."

The rotation also allowed soldiers to integrate with specialized units, including chemical defense teams, tactical psychological operations, and civil affairs, while introducing new capabilities such as handheld counter-drone devices.

"The fight against Unmanned Aerial Systems is really our main mission in OIR," Soults said.

Soldiers were challenged – from limited water supplies to field sanitation issues, extreme heat, and the grind of continuous operations, leaders had to adapt quickly.

"The constraints and the environment make you have to think and change," Soults said. "In a brigade-sized element, that doesn't happen quickly... and then, you have an enemy who is fighting you."

For Capt. Trang Pham, an infantry officer from Ankeny, lowa, sometimes the small things kept morale high. "For me, it's the shower when we get

out of here," she said. "Keep your eye on the prize."

Soldiers also found strength in each other. "I would not get through this without my team," said Sgt. Kalea Oftedahl, a human resources specialist from Decorah, Iowa. "I have the best team ever."

Senior Iowa National Guard leaders visited during the exercise to motivate and thank the troops. "Your rotation was highly successful," said Brig. Gen. Derek Adams, land component commander for Iowa.

"(The red bull patch) carries a lot of spirit de corps." Command

Sgt. Maj. Matthew Strasser echoed that praise: "They've earned their recognition. The 'ryder' brigade is always on top."

Looking back, Soults said the brigade grew significantly during the exercise. "Learning is winning, and winning is learning," he said. "We showed a lot of progress... JRTC put us in a good place for the next mission."

With rotation 25-08 complete, nearly 1,800 Red Bull soldiers now turn their focus to supporting Operation Inherent Resolve in the Middle East—bringing with them the hard-earned lessons of Louisiana to help ensure security, stability, and peace abroad.





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IOWA AIRMAN FIRST IN STATE TO RECEIVE MASTER COMBAT INFANTRY BADGE

Senior Master Sgt. Greg Cleghorn, the senior enlisted leader for the 132d Security Forces Squadron, was awarded the Master Combat Infantry Badge by Maj. Joseph Johns during annual training at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii, on Aug. 18, 2025.

The award marks the first time an Airman in the Iowa National Guard has received the Master Combat Infantry Badge (MCIB), a distinction that reflects decades of dedication and achievement across both Army and Air Force service.

"It's still an individual award at this point, but I'm proud to wear it and to represent the lowa Guard," Cleghorn said. "When I go someplace, it will be unique and draw attention to the state of lowa

while I am wearing lowa Guard patches."

The MCIB is awarded to service members who have previously earned both the Combat Infantry Badge (CIB) and the Expert Infantry Badge (EIB). Unlike the CIB and EIB, the MCIB features a gold wreath encircling the iconic musket on a blue rectangle, symbolizing the culmination of exceptional infantry skills and combat experience.

Cleghorn began his military career in 1998 when he enlisted in the U.S. Army. He was stationed with Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 4th Infantry Regiment in Hohenfels, Germany, and earned the Expert Infantry Badge in 2000.

He later joined the Iowa Army

National Guard's 194th Long Range Surveillance Detachment in 2004. During a deployment to Iraq, he was awarded the Combat Infantry Badge for his actions in a combat zone.

On May 17, 2025, the Department of the Army authorized the Master Combat Infantry Badge for wear by service members who have earned both the EIB and CIB.

Maj. Johns praised Cleghorn's leadership and impact within the squadron.

"His experience is so valuable for our squadron, and it shows during field training, classroom instruction, and in his leadership qualities," Johns said. "This is a great honor to award this to a very deserving Airman."

THE 54TH ANNUAL EANGUS CONFERENCE CONVENES IN RENO, NEVADA



The Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the United States (EANGUS) hosted its 54th Annual Conference from Monday, 11 August through Thursday, 14 August 2025 at the Grand Sierra Resort, Reno, Nevada. This highly anticipated gathering is one of the most important annual events for enlisted members of the National Guard. providing opportunities shape legislative priorities, celebrate service, and strengthen the bonds of camaraderie among Guard members and their supporters from across the nation.

Since its founding, the EANGUS conference has been a traveling tradition, moving each year to different parts of the United States. This model ensures that Guard members from every region have the opportunity to participate in a major national

event without always traveling across the entire country. The 2025 conference in Reno promises to be one of the largest yet, drawing around 2,000 attendees, including enlisted leaders, elected officials, and private industry partners.

Participants included Guard members representing all 54 states and territories, senior leaders from the National Guard Bureau (NGB), and decision-makers from the Department of Defense (DoD). In addition, private industry representatives displayed innovative equipment, supplies, and services used by the over 450,000 members of the Army and Air National Guard and their families.

More than just a meeting, the EANGUS Annual Conference is a forum where members evaluate proposals, discuss pressing challenges, and vote on legislative priorities of the association for the coming year. These priorities serve as the foundation for advocacy efforts on Capitol Hill, where EANGUS works to ensure Guardsmen receive the resources, recognition, and support they deserve.

This year, 24 Iowans made the trip to Reno to represent the interests of the Iowa Army and Air National Guard. Their delegation included both iunior and senior enlisted leaders, reflecting the full spectrum of Guard service and ensuring that the voices of all enlisted personnel new Soldiers, Airmen. and seasoned NCOs alike were heard in the national conversation.

Iowa's participation shows the state's strong tradition of involvement in EANGUS. From championing legislation to improve healthcare benefits for Guard families to advocating for modernized training and equipment, lowa delegates have consistently played an outsized role in shaping the future of the National Guard at the national level.

The 54th Annual FANGUS Conference in Reno offered a dynamic mix of professional development, service. celebration. The week began on August 11 with the Junior Enlisted Council's Welcome Night at the LEX Nightclub, a "Vegas Nights" themed kickoff that celebrated the energy and contributions of the Guard's newest members. The following morning, August 12, attendees gathered before sunrise for a 5K run and walk, reinforcing the Guard's culture of fitness and camaraderie. Later that day, service and sacrifice took center stage with a community blood drive an opportunity Guardsmen to extend their ethos of giving beyond the uniform.



Threaded throughout these events were powerful addresses from distinguished guest speakers. General Steven Nordhaus, Chief of the National Guard Bureau, set the tone with a strategic vision for the Guard's role in national defense and homeland security. Senior Enlisted Advisor John Raines spoke directly to the enlisted ranks, urging them to continue shaping policy through advocacy and professional excellence. From the Army side, Lieutenant General Jonathon Stubbs and Command Sergeant Major Brian Kendrick offered perspectives readiness, modernization, and the evolving role of the Army National Guard. Complementing them were Major General Duke Pirak, Acting Director of the Air National Guard, and Chief Master Sergeant Joshua Moore, who highlighted the importance of innovation and enlisted leadership in the Air Guard.

The conference also paid tribute to Nevada's proud Guard heritage, with remarks from Major General (ret) Ondra Berry, former Adjutant General of Nevada, and Mayor Hillary Schieve of Reno. who welcomed thousands of Guardsmen to her city. Together, these voices reminded attendees that the strength of the Guard lies not only in its size and capability, but in the relationships it fosters between soldiers, airmen, civilian communities and partners.

One of the most important

aspects of the EANGUS Annual Conference is the process of debating and adopting resolutions that guide the association's legislative work for These ahead. year resolutions-carefully reviewed in committee and then voted on by the general body—reflect the real needs of enlisted members and their families, ensuring that grassroots voices shape national policy.

In 2025, the resolutions emphasized several critical priorities. Delegates strongly supported initiatives to improve

healthcare access and TRICARE coverage, particularly for Guard families balancing the demands of part-time service with civilian careers. Proposals also called expanding education benefits, protecting GI Bill eligibility, and ensuring tuition assistance programs keep pace with rising costs so that Guardsmen and their dependents can pursue higher education without financial hardship.

Modernization and readiness featured prominently as well. Resolutions urged investment in updated equipment and training platforms, ensuring the Guard remains interoperable with active-duty forces and prepared for both domestic emergencies and overseas deployments. Delegates also emphasized the need for robust cyber defense capabilities and better access to modern communication tools, recognizing the Guard's growing role in safeguarding critical infrastructure at home.

Equally significant was the attention given to mental health resources and suicide prevention programs.
